



NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the North Carolina Utilities Commission (Commission) has scheduled a public hearing in conjunction with the Commission's review and evaluation of integrated resource planning (IRP) in North Carolina. The purpose of the review and evaluation is to ensure that each regulated electric utility operating in North Carolina is developing reliable projections of the long-range demands for electricity in its service area and is developing a combination of reliable resource options for meeting the anticipated demands in a cost-effective manner. IRP is intended to identify those electric resource options which can be obtained at least cost to ratepayers in North Carolina consistent with adequate, reliable electric service. IRP considers conservation, efficiency, load management and other demand-side program alternatives in the selection of resource options. Commission Rule R8-60 requires that each of the electric utilities furnish the Commission with a biennial report in even-numbered years that contains the specific information set out in that Commission Rule. In odd-numbered years, each of the electric utilities must file an update report updating its most recently filed biennial report. In addition, regulated electric utilities are required to include their plans for meeting customer electric needs via renewable energy resources and energy efficiency programs by submitting a Renewable Energy and Energy Efficiency Portfolio Standard compliance plan (REPS compliance plan) as part of the IRP filing.

During the public hearing to be held in this docket, the Commission will receive testimony from nonexpert public witnesses with respect to the most current IRP update reports and REPS compliance plans filed in 2019 by Duke Energy Progress, LLC; Duke Energy Carolinas, LLC; and Virginia Electric and Power Company, d/b/a Dominion Energy North Carolina. Public witness testimony will be received in accordance with Commission Rule R1-21(g).

A night hearing for the convenience of public witnesses and solely for the purpose of taking nonexpert public witness testimony is hereby scheduled as follows:

Raleigh: 7:00 p.m., on Monday, March 9, 2020, in Commission Hearing Room 2115, Dobbs Building, 430 North Salisbury Street, Raleigh, North Carolina.







BOB JORDAN, 1932-2020

Former lieutenant governor remembered for decades of service

Just east of Lake Tillery in Montgomery County stands a highway marker dedicated to one of the area's favorite sons.

It says simply, "Robert B. (Bob) Jordan III Highway."

Not that he was one of North Carolina's most powerful legislators. Not lieutenant governor. Not a champion of education. Not an architect of both the N.C. Rural Center and N.C. Biotechnology Center.

Jordan, 87, died Sunday at his home overlooking Lake Tillery, not far from the marker that bears his name. Gov. Roy Cooper is among those scheduled to speak at Wednesday's 11 a.m. memorial at the West Montgomery High School in Mount Gilead, just up the road from the family lumber business.

"Bob Jordan was one of the great leaders of North Carolina," said former Gov. Jim Hunt. "He led the legislature as lieutenant governor in a powerful way and helped us improve education and the folks who'd been left out in a way that's historic. He had an influence far beyond perhaps any legislative leader in history."

Jordan, a Democrat, was elected lieutenant governor in 1984 after four terms in the state Senate. In 1988 he ran and lost a race for governor against

incumbent Republican Jim Martin. He later chaired the Board of Trustees at his alma mater, N.C. State University.

Ned Cline, a former journalist, wrote a book in 2011 called "The Man from Mount Gilead." "Bob Jordan was an absolutely genuine person," Cline said Tuesday. "He was honest to the core. He worked tirelessly for the state and his community. And he said he did it because it was the right thing to do."

Jordan, a self-described "private person," was often more comfortable in the tranches than in the spotlight.

"He was not a great orator or great debater. That was not his strength," said Ferrel Guillory, director of the Program on Public Life at UNC Chapel Hill. "His strength was that day-to-day, grind-it-out, figure out what was good governance with particularly emphasis on rural North Carolina."

"He was in many ways a classic North Carolina business Democrat with a streak of addressing poverty addressing people left behind by economic change."

FORGING COMPROMISE

After graduating from N.C. State in 1954, Jordan joined the Army. An officer, he was stationed in Europe through 1956 and left the service as captain. Soon, at 24, he was asked to serve as the

Mount Gilead Town Board. Four years later he won appointment to the Consolidated University of North Carolina Board of Trustees and remained on when it became the UNC Board of Governors.

His 1976 election to the Senate marked his start in state politics. With the help of powerful patrons, including Democratic Sen. Ken Royall of Durham, he became chairman of one of the Senate's top budget committees in his first term.

It was as lieutenant governor that Jordan saw his biggest accomplishments.

Known for forging compromises, he jump-started a stalled highway funding package by getting Martin to support a gas tax increase and persuading Democratic House Speaker Liston Ramsey to transfer the cost of some programs from the Highway Fund to the General Fund.

He also orchestrated a House-Senate compromise to finance school construction and helped start the N.C. Teaching Fellows, a scholarship program for teachers.

What he didn't do was reform a legislative process where most budget decisions were made behind closed doors. Despite a promise to do so, he was unable to get his House counterparts to end the secret of the so-called "super-sub."

But he helped create two institutions: the Biotech Center and the Rural Center. He believed both would bolster economic development.

"He was our strongest champion for (the Biotech Center)," recalled Gerry Hancock, a former law-maker. "He would not have happened without him."

And Hancock said Jordan, himself a native of rural North Carolina, instinctively understood the challenges. The answers, he knew, were in a comprehensive program to address everything from education to infrastructure.

"He knew that if you didn't have an organiza-

tion that was designed to push that ... and bring people together and encourage them to act on all those things simultaneously, you would not have the economic advancement that we need," Hancock said.

NO IDEOLOGUE

In 1988, Jordan's gubernatorial campaign ran a TV ad implying that Martin was away sailing when the Legislature was still working. Martin said Jordan had told him that he wouldn't make his vacation an issue.

"He called and apologized for it," Martin said Tuesday. "I said, 'Don't worry about it because I think it helped me. It showed my family came first.' (But) it embarrassed him ... I thought that was very decent."

Martin said he and Jordan would later call each other "to trot an idea out or to just chat," often about the increased polarization of politics in North Carolina and the country. Jordan "didn't approach things as an ideologue or even as a politician," Hancock said. "What a lot of us remember most about him is he one of the most honorable, decent, hard-working people we've ever known."

Former Sen. Tony Rand, a longtime Democratic leader, called Jordan "the best man (I) ever knew in politics or state government."

It's a sentiment shared by Cline, the former journalist. "He was that way from the first time I met him," Cline said. "He did the right thing for the right reason. And he did it with grace."

Female fatally shot in northwest Charlotte parking lot, police say

A female found shot in a northwest Charlotte parking lot has become the city's latest homicide case, according to Charlotte-Mecklenburg Police.

The identity of victim had not been released by police early Tuesday. Investigators say it happened around 8 p.m. Sunday in the 3200 block of Rozzelles Ferry Road, near the intersection of Interstate 85 and Brookshire Boulevard.

"Upon arrival, officers located a female with a gunshot wound in a parking lot off of Rozzelles Ferry Road," a press release said.

"She was transported to the hospital by medic and later pronounced deceased by hospital staff. Homicide Detectives are currently canvassing the area to determine whether there are any additional witnesses to this incident."

Police have not said if they have a suspect in the case. The woman's death is the 11th homicide this year. This time last year, Charlotte had experienced 12 homicides.

Lawsuits accuse Boy Scouts of America of sex abuse in NC

After years of financial woes and declining membership, Boy Scouts of America has filed for bankruptcy.

The organization faces rising costs associated with civil lawsuits alleging that sex abuse by Scoutmasters and Scout leaders as several states have shifted policies on statute of limitation laws.

At least 10 men, represented by Abused in Scouting, say they were sexually abused as boys in North Carolina — including in tents in Pisgah National Forest, at Camp Bud Schiele in Rutherfordton and in scoutmasters' homes.

Six of the men said they were sexually abused consistently for over two

years, according to their representatives.

The alleged abuses in North Carolina occurred between 1958 and 1995. Decades later, the claimants are now adults and many of the accused are dead.

The 10 men who say they were abused in N.C. ranged in age from 7 to 16 when the abuse began. At least one was living in a home for orphans at the time the abuse occurred, according to their representatives.

Eight of the men were N.C. residents at the time, while two say they were based on trips through several other states.

STORIES OF ABUSE IN N.C.

One anecdote provided by Abused in Scouting describes a Marion Scoutmaster who climbed into a 12-year-old's sleeping bag and sexually assaulted him during local campouts for approximately a year.

Another details how a troop leader invited a scout who lived at an orphanage to have dinner at

his home in Oxford. Instead, the boy was groped and fondled for hours, AIS said.

A Morganton Scoutmaster allegedly assaulted a boy for over two years during scout camp and overnight campouts, AIS said. The Scoutmaster reportedly threatened to kill the claimant's parents if he revealed the events.

One man described being lured to the bathrooms at Camp Bud Schiele in Rutherfordton as a child. The scout leader told him he needed help on a project concerning how long it took young boys to achieve an erection and ejaculate, and masturbated in front of the child, according to a summary provided by Abused in Scouting.

THE 'PERVERSION FILES'

For over five decades, the BSA maintained a roster of blacklisted volunteers known internally as the "perversion files." Those records, some of which have been released to the public by court orders, indicate that BSA dismissed thousands of leaders for abusing children — and many were never reported to law enforcement.

A Fayetteville Scoutmaster accused of two years of sexual abuse by one of Abused in Scouting's clients was named in those documents, the Asheville Citizen Times confirmed. AIS's client alleges that the Fayetteville Scoutmaster raped him for two years, during camping trips as well as at the Scoutmaster's home and at a local motel.

The Scoutmaster's file in the BSA system, made public in a lawsuit and examined by the Citizen Times, said he "did not deny criminal charges of sodomy" against young boys. The file said "at least 8 young scouts (were) involved."

Wall Street is now waking up to possible coronavirus harm

For weeks, there has been a strange divergence among those trying to predict what coronavirus might mean for financial markets and the world economy. People in the trenches of global commerce — supply chain managers, travel industry experts, employers large and small — warned of substantial disruptions to their businesses. And public health authorities feared that the disease could spread far


beyond Wuhan in China. Yet financial markets and most economic forecasters projected the virus outbreak wouldn't do much harm to the economy and corporate profits — at the least, nothing that an interest-rate cut or two from the Federal Reserve couldn't fix. The S&P 500 hit a new high last Wednesday. Something had to give, and on Monday it did. After reports of people infected with the virus in the major economies of South Korea and Italy, the more pessimistic view began to prevail across

major world markets. On Tuesday, that selling in stocks moderated somewhat, but shares fell in Europe and Asia, and the S&P 500 saw its first back-to-back 3% losses since the summer of 2015. There remains huge uncertainty about how widely the virus will spread and how much damage it will do. But the financial world is realizing just how much is at stake — and how different this is from other recent hiccups in the global economy, notably last year's trade war between the United States and China.

"It's one thing if Wuhan is on lockdown, another if all of China is on lockdown, another if all of Asia is on lockdown, and another if the whole world is on lockdown," said Patrick Chovanec, an adviser for Silvercrest Asset Management and an expert on the Chinese economy. "The last few days, sentiment has shifted — because it's very different to have one country on lockdown for a couple of weeks versus rolling lockdowns throughout the global economy." Since the end of the global financial crisis

more than a decade ago, investors who have been the most alarmist about various risks have had a tendency to lose money. Global asset prices have been on a steady march upward despite the eurozone crisis, the end of the Federal Reserve's quantitative easing, the trade war and every other problem that has occupied financial headlines. So it is understandable if investors were quick to assume that coronavirus would follow a similar pattern — a temporary blip that reduced China's growth for a quarter or two but had little lasting impact. Markets accustomed to optimism may be all the more vulnerable if the virus becomes a global pandemic that causes meaningful pullback of commerce across major

economies. Even after Monday's sell-off — a 3.4% drop in the S&P, the steepest single-day retrenchment in two years — financial markets remain richly valued. The U.S. stock market remained above its level of Feb. 7. The trade war, in which the United States and China placed tariffs on specific imported goods, caused a significant slump in manufacturing last year. But the coronavirus is hurting service industries as well. If the authorities in major world economies start shutting down any facility where large numbers of people congregate — a list that includes factories, shopping malls and airports — the damage could prove broad and lasting.

Fortnite earnings continue to drop after years of popularity

In a sign that interest in the video game Fortnite is perhaps waning, earnings from the game that made Cary-based Epic Games an industry juggernaut continue to decline.

Revenue from Fortnite in January hit its lowest level since November 2017, according to a new report from Nielsen's SuperData.

While SuperData did not disclose how much money Epic made from Fortnite in January, a report from Recode — citing SuperData numbers — put November 2017's haul at around \$55 million. The free, battle-royale version of the game first launched in September 2017.

At its peak, Fortnite brought in \$372.2 million in December 2018. But as recently as last September, monthly revenue dropped below \$100 million, SuperData estimated. While money from the game continues to decline, Fortnite has remained a cash cow for Epic Games. Last year, the game made \$1.8 billion, making it the top-grossing online video game of that year, according to SuperData.

However, that total was down 25% from the year prior, when it was also the top-grossing online video game with an estimated \$2.4 billion in revenue.

Epic Games declined to comment on SuperData's report, with a spokesperson responding that the company doesn't comment on, or share, financial information.

Will Hershey, CEO of Roundhill Investments, which tracks the video game industry, said this appears to be a meaning-

ful decline for Epic Games.

"I think that there has to be some real concern," Hershey said in an email. "Epic has now had two years to perfect its monetization strategy and optimize [average revenue per user], suggesting that engagement and player count have meaningfully declined."

Hershey said he believes that Fortnite will become increasingly dependent on the launch of new seasons and content within the game. Just last week, a new season launched on Fortnite built around themes of spies and covert operatives. The tech news website TechCrunch called the new season a return to form for Fortnite.

Epic makes money from Fortnite not from selling the game, but instead by selling upgrades around appearances and custom dance moves. In each season it launches, those upgrades change giving players new things to purchase. The upgrades often coincide around partnerships with well-known intellectual property, like "Star Wars," the television show "Stranger Things" or the "John Wick" movies.

It's those constant upgrades that has kept Fortnite popular for so long, a report from Nielsen said last year. But a surge of other games copying that payment model have made competing for money from users harder.

Outside of Fortnite, other parts of the business appear to be growing.

In 2018, Epic launched a competitor to Steam — as well as Apple and Google — called the Epic Games Store in an effort to bring more competition to app stores. Epic Games CEO Tim Sweeney has said that Apple and Google, especially, charge developers too much money. The Epic Games Store only takes 12% from sales made on its platform while Apple and Google take 30%.

However, Epic's competitors in these spaces are pretty entrenched.

"Steam," Hershey noted, "the most popular platform for PC gaming, has achieved a new record for concurrent users." The company also licenses its graphics software engine, Unreal, to companies that use its 3-D rendering technology, like movie studios and design firms.

The company brings in around \$200 million per year through its licensing of the engine, Michael Pachter, an analyst at Wedbush Securities, told The News & Observer last year.

The decline in revenue from Fortnite comes as Epic continues to expand locally. The company said it will begin construction this year on a new building at its corporate campus in Cary that could potentially make room for 2,000 more employees.

Boeing CEO has long checklist of goals to earn \$7 million bonus

New Boeing CEO Dave Calhoun will have to deliver a substantial list of successes within three years or he'll miss out on a \$7 million performance bonus that came with his appointment to the top job in December.

In January, the Boeing board had laid out Calhoun's total compensation, which would give him almost \$36 million over a three-year period provided he meets yearly financial targets as well as broader milestones.

That total included the supplementary \$7 million performance-based in-

centive award. The only milestone for that award previously set out publicly was getting the 737 MAX safely back into service. In a filing Monday with the Securities and Exchange Commission, that goal was just the first in a lengthy list of stringent terms laid out for Calhoun by the board's compensation committee. The goals:

- Worldwide regulatory clearance for the 737 MAX and the aircraft's safe return to service, including all of the almost 800 MAXs currently grounded.
- Strengthening of Boeing's engineering culture in line with board recommendations since the two fatal MAX accidents.

- The entry into service of the 777X and a successful ramp-up of production and deliveries.

- A crewed flight of Boeing's Starliner space vehicle.

- Stabilization of KC-46 Air Force tanker production.
- Achievement of milestones for the T-7A jet fighter trainer aircraft, the MQ-25 Stingray aerial refueling drone for the Navy, and the Air Force One presidential jet program.

- Successful execution of the long-range business plan for Boeing Global Services.
- Closing of the joint venture with Embraer of Brazil, assuming regulatory approval.

If the performance goals are not substantially achieved by Dec. 31, 2023, then the \$7 million "will be forfeited in its entirety," the SEC filing says.



BLANEY'S ATTEMPTED PUSH OF NEWMAN LED TO VIOLENT CRASH

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla. (AP) — Drafting, blocking and bumping are essential elements of racing on NASCAR's fastest tracks. When Ryan Blaney pushed fellow Ford driver Ryan Newman in the final lap of the Daytona 500, it was something both men

have done hundreds of times on superspeedways.

For a few seconds, it looked like everything was going to work out Monday night, with a career-defining Daytona 500 victory for Newman. Then Newman's car angled back into traffic, creating the most violent and frightening wreck at Daytona since the death of Dale Earnhardt in 2001.

What happened? Where did it go wrong? Could it have been prevented?

There are no simple answers. Here's what we know:

Race-winner Denny Hamlin gave Blaney a huge shove that pushed him toward leader Newman and caused Blaney's car to

wobble. Blaney regrouped and seemingly had enough momentum to drive by Newman when he swerved low. Newman tried to block the move and got hit by Blaney.

"We pushed Newman there to the lead and then we got a push from (Hamlin). ... I was committed to just pushing (Newman) to the win and having a Ford win it and got the bumpers hooked up wrong," Blaney said.

Bump drafting at 200 mph is a delicate maneuver, and a few inches can turn victory into chaos.

Blaney hit Newman's bumper to the right of center, causing Newman's car to turn right, barely missing Hamlin, and slam-

ming into the energy-absorbing barrier. The impact caused Newman's car to flip onto its roof and then its side. Corey LaJoie then crushed the driver's side of Newman's car, sending it airborne again. Newman's car again landed on its roof and skidded past the finish line to a stop, spewing sparks and fuel that caused a fire. It took safety crews about 16 minutes to extricate Newman from his No. 6 Ford and load him into a waiting ambulance. He remained hospitalized Tuesday afternoon.

The aerodynamics package NASCAR uses at Daytona and Talladega, the two fastest and biggest tracks in the series, creates tight packs of cars running close to 200 mph. Drivers work

together and draft off each other, essentially pushing the car in front of them, to maintain momentum and avoid losing positions.

A car running alone in the pack without a drafting partner is often shuffled back in the field. Drivers who can lock bumpers and stay connected surge toward the front. The downside to this racing is that one wiggle can create a chain-reaction accident, and pack racing usually leads to massive wrecks that collect multiple competitors who have no way of avoiding melees.

NC justices asked to hear legislative session case

RALEIGH — Plaintiffs challenging the constitutionality of a legislative session Republicans quickly called in 2016 to limit the power of Democratic Gov. Roy Cooper before he could take office now want the state's highest court to hear their case.

Lawyers for Common Cause and ten citizens filed an appeal petition with the state Supreme Court on Tuesday, about a month after the Court of Appeals upheld the legality of the three-day session in December 2016.

Republicans in charge of the House and Senate approved a pair of measures during the session that weakened Cooper's power as governor.

Those who sued said the fleetness of GOP leaders calling the session and pushing through legislation violated their right in the North Carolina Constitution to "instruct their representatives."

The three-judge Court of Appeals panel unanimously upheld a lower court ruling that refused to invalidate the laws approved in that session. Evidence showed the public clearly knew

about the session, the Court of Appeals opinion read, with citizens sending emails to lawmakers and speaking at the Legislative Building to let them know their feelings. The session began roughly two hours after another legislative session on Hurricane Matthew relief adjourned.

In Tuesday's petition, the plaintiffs' lawyers said the Court of Appeals panel got it wrong, because there was "no meaningful opportunity for citizens to persuade their representatives."

The Court of Appeals failed to consider that defendants' conduct was

especially egregious given the scope of the legislation they enacted," the attorney wrote.

Since the Jan. 21 ruling was unanimous, the Supreme Court isn't required to intervene in the case.

The December 2016 laws forced Cooper to have his Cabinet appointees confirmed by senators, among other limitations on his power. Cooper successfully sued to block some changes, such as shifting control over administering elections and reducing the number of employees he could hire.
