The public hearing has been scheduled to begin Tuesday, September 15, 2020, at 10:00 a.m., in Commission Hearing Room 2115, Dobbs Building, 430 North Salisbury Street, Raleigh, North Carolina. The proceeding is being held pursuant to the provisions of N.C.G.S. § 62–133.2 and Commission Rule R8-55 for the purpose of determining whether an increment or decrement rider is required in order to reflect changes in the cost of fuel and fuel-related costs over or under the base fuel rate established for DEP in its last general rate case. Public witness-testimony will be received in accordance with Commission Rule R1-21(g).

Duke Energy Progress filed an application and testimony relative to the subject matter of the proceeding on June 9, 2020. The proposed change in rates is related to fuel and fuel-related costs. The proposed change would result in a decrease of the present fuel and fuel-related rates of all customer classes, with the amount of the decrease varying for different customer classes. The decrease in the monthly bill of a typical residential customer using 1,000 kilowatt hours per month would be \$4.38, excluding the regulatory fee. The change in all fuel and fuel-related rates would be effective for service rendered on and after December 1, 2020.

Duke campus housing only for 1st, 2nd year students in fall

DURHAM - Only firstand second-year students at Duke University will be allowed to live in campus housing this fall, according to a school administrator in releasing a plan designed to prevent the spread of COVID-19.

In an email to Duke faculty, Provost Sally Kornbluth said upperclassmen and graduate students will take online classes in the fall semester, which begins Aug. 17.

Juniors and seniors living off campus will have access to libraries and laboratories, but can't enter residence halls, dining halls and social spaces, The News & Observer of Raleigh reported Sunday. The restrictions also will apply to student-athletes.

Duke previously had upperclassmen arriving on Aug. 15, but President Vincent Price had said plans could change. The firstand second-year students will arrive in waves starting Aug. 10. Kornbluth wrote the limitations aims to reduce campus population density.

Doctoral students still will be allowed on the Durham campus to perform research.

Duke already announced that on-campus students would be tested for COVID-19 before classes begin. There also will be daily health screenings for students and faculty, as well as face mask or coverings mandates for everyone.

Duke has more than 15,600

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students, of which more than 40% are undergraduates. The fall semester will end before Thanksgiving, with no fall break, and students coming to campus are asked to remain in town through the semester.

University of North Carolina system schools and many private colleges in the state already have announced a mix of in-person and online classes for the semester.

Cooper-Suggs to succeed Farmer-Butterfield in NC House

WILSON - A retired educator and county Democratic Party chairwoman will serve out the term of former North Carolina state Rep. Jean Farmer-Butterfield and seek her own two-year term in the

Democratic activists in Wilson County meeting on Saturday selected Linda Cooper-Suggs to fill the vacancy created when Farmer-Butterfield resigned from her 24th House District seat, The Wilson Times reported.

Farmer-Butterfield stepped down last week after the legislature confirmed her as Gov. Roy Cooper's nominee to join the North Carolina Employment Security Board of Review. The governor is now obligated by law to formally appoint Cooper-Suggs.

Nine candidates were initially seeking the seat. Local party officials ultimately voted from a list of six hopefuls.

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Cooper-Suggs, the Wilson Democratic Party leader since 2017, also was picked as the candidate to take on Republican Mick Rankin in November. Farmer-Butterfield, a House member since 2003, had already won the Democratic primary in

"I thank everyone for putting their trust in me and for their vote," Cooper-Suggs said Saturday. "I thank everyone for their hard work. We are in this together."

In light of social distancing due to COVID-19, Saturday's meeting was a combination of video conferencing and motorists sitting in their cars in a church parking lot.

Driver dead after collision with parked trash truck

WINSTON-SALEM - A sport utility vehicle driver died when she crashed into the back of a garbage truck parked along the side of a North Carolina road, police said.

Kelly Burick Taylor, 45, of Rural Hall, was driving north on University Parkway at midday Saturday when she collided into the parked truck on the right side of the road, according to a Winston-Salem police news release.

Emergency workers declared Taylor dead at the scene, media outlets reported, and her passenger was taken to the hospital with serious injuries.
